Objective

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service requests support from the 89th Legislature to invest in increased personnel to address the educational programming demands of population growth in Texas. Through the combined strength of our Disaster Assessment & Recovery (DAR) Unit and the Extension Agent Network, our agency operates as a conduit of information and a force multiplier to counties and communities in times of crises, such as COVID-19, flooding, hurricanes, and wildfires.

- Community resiliency and preparedness.
- Effective coordination and collaboration between local and state government during disasters.
- Increased demand for preventive health education.
- Unmet workforce development needs.
- A rapid increase in land fragmentation across the state.

As part of the Texas A&M University System's Keeping Texas Prepared Initiative, our DAR Unit was partially expanded by the 88th Texas Legislature and supported with funds for competitive salaries. However, we still face critical personnel gaps in addressing the demands of Texas' growth as we work to leverage the DAR Unit with support from our County Extension Agents, who serve as a force multiplier resource during crises like COVID-19, hurricanes, and wildfires. The agent network at full force would enable more effective communication and assistance to local government across the state during disaster.



Agency support for the historic Land-Grant Mission

Increase County Agents for a High Growth State

Rapid population growth and land development raises the demand for our agency's educational programs in Texas agriculture, human health, youth development and county emergency preparedness and stretches our agent's capacity to serve their communities.



Bolster Specialists and Programming

Subject matter experts in our agency's core agricultural and health programming are also a crucial part of the Keeping Texas Prepared Initiative and to promote new technologies and research to Texans.

Vehicle Replacement

New vehicles to support programming needs and the DAR Unit.

Create Office of State Geographer

A statewide analysis hub for development trends and demographics to provide accurate data to state and local leaders on land usage and population growth, economic opportunity, disaster preparedness, and mitigation efforts.

Takeaways

A full realignment of DAR Unit personnel provides capacity and force multiplier resources to all Texas communities.

Statewide connectivity and resiliency strategies for emergency response and resiliency help to protect our state's agricultural economy and landowners.
