# About 4-H

Palo Pinto County 4-H and the 4-H clubs in Palo Pinto County are part of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program which is conducted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

Here is some information about 4-H and the enrollment process:

## **4-H Year**

September 1st—August 31st

## **Youth Age Requirements**

Youth may participate in 4-H from September 1st of grade three through August 31st following completion of grade twelve, with these age restrictions:

- o Minimum age - 8

(as of September 1, 2025, in addition to being in the 3rd grade)

- o Maximum age - 18

## **Clover Kids**

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service extends a limited version of the 4-H experience to youth in grades K-2 as “4-H Clover Kids.” This age category is further defined as youth who are eligible to enroll in Kindergarten on September 1 of the current year and have not entered (started classes) the third grade on September 1. Clover Kids are not eligible to serve as club officers, nor are they eligible to participate in activities, recognition programs, and competitive events reserved for older youth. Palo Pinto County 4-H does offer some non-competitive opportunities for Clover Kids.

## **Adult Volunteers**

All 4-H adult volunteers must complete a 4-H volunteer application each year. To continually guarantee the safety of the members during 4-H participation, adult volunteers working directly with youth must complete a criminal background check and complete required online trainings.

## **Yearly Enrollment/Re-Enrollment Requirement**

Each year on August 15th all membership in Texas 4-H goes to inactive and all youth and adult volunteers must enroll or re-enroll. A youth that is 8 years old and going into the 3rd grade must wait until September 1st to enroll for proper fees to be accessed. The Texas 4-H year officially starts on September 1.

## **How much does it cost?**

Youth Club Member Participation Fee

\$25.00 - August 15th - October 31st

\$30.00 - November 1 to Completion of the 4-H Year

Please note to participate in the Palo Pinto County Junior Livestock Show members must be enrolled by December 15th.

Clover kids (grades K-2) - \$10.00

Adults -\$10.00

This volunteer applicant fee will be reimbursed by Palo Pinto County 4-H upon request to the Extension Office.

## **About 4-H Online**

- 4HOnline is the official registration system for adult and youth members directly involved with 4-H.
- 4HOnline is a secured system that is in compliance with the PCI Security Standards Council. Texas 4-H nor 4HOnline shares or sells any personal information to third-party vendors without your knowledge or permission.
- Most questions can be answered by calling the Extension Office at 940-659-1228.
- An approved youth or adult member record means a person is officially enrolled with Texas 4-H and will be able to register and participate in a variety of activities and events.
- Adult volunteers are required to be screened through the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Volunteer Standards every three years. The screening process can take up to two weeks.
- If your family has moved to a NEW county in Texas, contact the local county office to have the FAMILY PROFILE moved to the new county. Do not create a new profile.

## New Family



- From the 4-H Online Site, <https://texas.4honline.com>, select to set up a profile.  
Setup only one family profile per household.
- Enter an e-mail address that is checked often.  
This will be how you get communication.
- Create a password.  
Requirements are displayed if not validated.
- Complete all family information.



- Start adding members.  
Enter one member profile at a time.  
The Next button will take you through each screen.
- Enter information in all the fields on the Questions screen.  
Youth Birthdate and school grade determines eligibility.
- Youth selects at least one club and one project.  
Adult selects volunteer type, clubs and projects.
- Complete the Health and Consents Screens.  
Click Next through each screen.

- Select payment and agree to Payment and Refund terms.

## Returning Family

- Contact the County Extension Office at 940-659-1228 for password assistance or click Reset Password link.
- Do Not Create a NEW Family Profile.
- Review and update family information.



- Click Enroll Now next to the member's name.
- You can only enroll one member at a time.
- Click Next through each screen.
- You must enter school, grade, clubs and projects
- Complete the Health and Consents Screens.

# **Get Involved**

## **Palo Pinto County 4-H Clubs**

When you join 4-H, you pick a 4-H club. Members are encouraged to get involved with their 4-H club. 4-H clubs in Palo Pinto County meet monthly during the school year. Palo Pinto County currently has the following clubs:

Gordon 4-H Club  
Graford 4-H Club  
Mineral Wells 4-H Club  
Palo Pinto County 4-H Shooting Sports Club  
Santo 4-H Club  
Strawn 4-H Club  
Sturdivant 4-H Club (Located in Mineral Wells)

## **What does a 4-H club do?**

It elects its own officers and conducts its own business. The club group usually has a president, vice president(s), secretary, treasurer, reporter and may have a historian or parliamentarian. The group discusses business and makes plans for activities. In addition, each meeting usually includes some kind of special educational program. The special program can be demonstrations by members, talks by members, parents or resource person(s), or anything else that interests the group.

Clubs also participate in community service projects, tour interesting places and learn interesting things. 4-H'ers learn leadership skills by planning club activities and by being officers in their clubs. Older 4-H members act as teen leaders, assisting adult volunteers with projects and activities for younger members. 4-H members also attend camps, contests and conferences at the county, district, state and national levels.



# What is a 4-H Project?

The 4-H method is “learn by doing.” Members complete learning experiences called 4-H projects. A project is a subject or area of interest that the 4-H member wants to learn more about. There are more than 40 areas that are supported by project materials, but a member may also choose from other areas.

Please note, various projects may have specific deadlines for participation. If you are interested in a specific project, please be sure to ask about the requirements. For example, livestock and rabbit projects have tag-in requirements. The shooting sports project has a mandatory safety meeting held once per year.

Members can submit a complete 4-H Record Book for judging. These are usually due in June. A complete 4-H Record Book contains a Personal Information Page, 4-H Story and Photo Portfolio, and a Texas 4-H Report Form. The Extension office can provide you with the resources and more information about putting together a 4-H Record Book.

## Palo Pinto County 4-H Awards

### Criteria Based Awards

Members must apply for these awards, which are based on the member's age, level of participation and leadership experiences. Those who complete the requirements will be recognized with the award. These awards include:

- Rookie Award - Any Age First Year 4-H Member
- Honor Roll Award - Junior members, 3rd - 5th Grades
- All-Star Award - Intermediate members, 6th - 8th Grades
- Letterman Award - Senior members, 9th - 12th Grades
